In 1988 Dublin, the capital city of the Irish Republic, celebrates its Millenium - that means it is 1,000 years since it was founded in AD988. You can imagine that it will be guite a birthday party, lasting all



In honour of the occasion we have built a model of Dublin City Hall from over 300,000 LEGO bricks and have presented it to the city where it will have pride of place in their Millenium Exhibitions through the year.

The model was designed and built by Elaine Jones, one of our four full-time model makers and it took her five months to complete!


Elaine had copies of the original architect's drawings dating from 1768 to guide her to ensure that every detail was correct.

The model is open at the back so that you can look into the splendid circular room under the dome with its beautiful mosaic floor and lofty columns. This is where the model will be displayed in the real building from mid-April until the end of 1988.

Prior to that it will be on show as part of the 'Dublin Be Proud' exhibition being held in Arnotts, a big Dublin department store, from March 24-April 9th.

We hope that Dublin will be proud of our model of one of their finest buildings too.



This one traces the history of the great adventurers from Marco Polo up to the modern era with Sir Edmund Hilary and Sherpa Tenzing, the first men to conquer Mount Everest in 1952.


Animated LEGO Models show Christopher Columbus discovering America, Amundsen and Scott at the South Pole, Thor Heyerdahl's famous ships Kon Tiki and Ra in which he made incredible voyages, and many more.

This fascinating exhibition runs from March 19th to April 16th. Entry is free and it is well worth a visit for those of you able to get to London.

For those of you who cannot, other big exhibitions are planned for Blackpool in the Summer and Dublin next Christmas. Details of those shows will be given in future issues of Bricks 'n' Pieces.

The entrance to the exhibition shows Captain Cook who discovered Australia. 'Eventyrere' means 'Adventurers' in Danish, but it will be written in English when the show comes to Harrods!





Another travelling exhibition of quite a different kind opens in May. This will feature LEGO models designed by famous architects, designers and artists - people like Kit Williams for example, who created the famous children's book 'Masquerade' which some of you may have.

The exhibition will include a history of constructional toys plus some of the earliest LEGO sets. There will also be 'Workshop' areas where children can build their own creations.

The show has been created by Clwyd County Council's Library & Museums Service, and generously sponsored by Alfred McAlpine Plc, Ove Arup & Partners, Harlech TV and PRIVATbanken.

It will open at Bodelwyddan Castle near St. Asaph, Clwyd, on 2nd May 1988 and thereafter will tour as follows:




